Using empirical data drawn from a large sample of student writing, compared against written sources, *Academic Writing and Plagiarism* argues that some plagiarism, in this linguistic context, can be regarded as a failure of pedagogy rather than a deliberate attempt to transgress. The book examines the implications of this gap between the institutions' expectations of the students, student performance and institutional awareness, and suggests pedagogic solutions to be implemented at student, tutor and institutional levels. *Academic Writing and Plagiarism* is a cutting-edge research monograph which will be essential reading for researchers in applied linguistics.
